Wyoming Real Estate, Farms And Businesses
Change Hands As Sales Show Increase In July

WYOMING — The marriage of Emily French, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Will French of Wyoming, and Pfc. Harry E. Boots, jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Boots of Monticello, was solemnized at the Trinity Methodist parsonage in Cedar Rapids, July 17. The Rev. J. E. DeLong read the service. The couple were attended by Mr. and Mrs. William Ehlts of Mount Vernon, sister and brother-in-law of the bridegroom.

The bride was attired in a tan and blue suit with tan accessories. Her attendant's gown was of navy blue silk with harmonizing accessories. Immediately after the ceremony the couple left for Monticello where they remained until July 23, when the bridegroom left for his station at Camp Haan, Calif. He was inducted into service in November of 1942 and is with the coast artillery. The bride attended the Wyoming schools. She is employed at the Century Ordnance division in Cedar Rapids, where she will continue working for the duration.

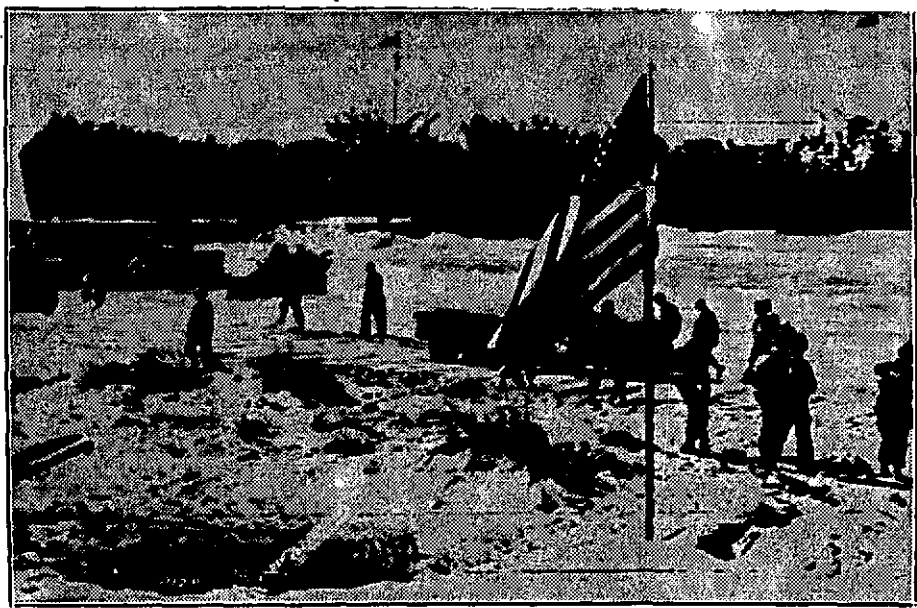

William Bradke Celebrates 96th Birthday Anniversary

New Hopkinton Unit Of United Service Women
Elects Mrs. Earl Dunlap As First President

HOPKINTON — William M. Bradke, Hopkinton's oldest resident, celebrated his 96th birthday at his home here Saturday. He was born in Germany on July 24, 1874. He attended school and grew to manhood there, and served a year in the war with France in 1871.

He was married in Germany to Frederika Warner. After being a shepherd in his native country for a number of years, he brought his wife and two children to America, coming directly to Hopkinton in 1881, where his brother Herman had previously established a home. He worked for Dr. Hugh Livingstone at Hopkinton for two years, then purchased 47 acres of land west of Hopkinton and kept adding more until he owned 240 acres. He and his wife retired from the farm in 1909 and moved to Hopkinton. His wife died in 1921. Since then he has been cared for by his daughter Martha, now Mrs. Rudolph Gienapp.

He is very feeble and has been confined to his bed since early in February of this year. He has one son, Frank Bradke, Ryan, and three daughters, Mrs. Walter File, Mrs. Fred Wilson and Mrs. Rudolph Gienapp, all of Hopkinton.
